IV. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course traces the development of art education curricula in American schools and universities from the nineteenth century to the present. A special emphasis will be placed on contemporary issues and influences in the fields of art education. During the course, an exemplary art unit of study will be developed.

One of the goals of the MFA & MED programs at Mississippi College is to educate candidates in the area of teaching and learning and then direct them in applying this knowledge to teaching art at the post secondary level. It is the intent of this degree program to train good teachers of art as well as studio artists. As graduates become teachers of art, they will be faced with the challenge of implementing a variety of studio and lecture art courses. Furthermore, they will be teaching most of these courses for the first time. A critical area in the teaching of art is planning, designing, and implementing a quality curriculum. In addition, it is vital that this curriculum align with the mission statement of the school. Therefore, it is essential that the current or future teacher of art understand the processes of developing and building sequential concepts and then assess learning in a meaningful way. This course will address these concerns and attempt to strengthen the teaching skills of the post secondary teacher.

objects.

- I. Identify appropriate methods of assessment for studio art.
- J. Prepare a professional interview portfolio.
