### I. COURSE TITLE

ART 6508      Research Topics in Art History: Periods      3 semester hours

### III. COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is a seminar course involving research on approved periods and the development of visual resources supporting each.

### IV. RATIONALE

In addition to a general knowledge of art history from pre-historic to contemporary periods, professional artists and art educators need a structured setting to conduct in-depth research in art history. The student will benefit as an artist and/or art educator from a study of historical setting, individual style, art content, and technique. The research will include a written component in addition to a visual component, thus providing excellent resource material for future use by the student.

### V. LEARNING OBJECTIVES AND OUTCOMES

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- A. apply methods of research that include primary and secondary sources in collecting a body of information about periods of art.
- B. incorporate a structure for reporting research that includes art criticism.
- C. identify aesthetic theories as they relate to each period.
- D. incorporate an APA format.
- E. create original works of art that incorporate concepts, techniques, and/or styles from the research of periods of art.
- F. give a formal visual and verbal presentation of research.
- G. complete an annotated bibliography that relates to the selected periods.

## **VIII. ASSIGNMENTS**

- A. Annotated bibliography on approved periods
- B. Research paper on approved periods which includes:
  - 1. Biographical information
  - 2. Description, analysis, interpretation, and evaluation of artistic style, historical context, and aesthetic theory.
  - 3. Comparison and synthesis of artwork
  - 4. Discussion of own work in relation to periods studied.
- C. Presentation of periods and research
- D. Works of art that reflect research

## **IX. EVALUATION**

- A. Annotated Bibliography  
Students will review ten resources related to each of the selected periods and record relevant information. Evaluation will be based on a) concise content, b) grammar, c) accurate bibliographic information, and d) APA style.
- B. Research Paper  
The student will write a 12-15 page paper on approved periods. Evaluation will be based on a) accurate information, b) documented research that reflects a synthesized evaluation of artistic style, historical context, and aesthetic theory, c) discussion of own work, d) APA style, and e) grammar.
- C. Presentation  
The student will give a 10-15 minute presentation of their research attending to style, techniques, and philosophies using Power Point. Evaluation will be based on a) content, b) communication of concepts, c) professionalism, and d) use of visual resources.
- D. Works of Art  
The student will create a series of artworks using the media of their choice that reflects concepts discovered from their research. Evaluation will be based on a) appropriate use of media, b) formal properties, c) visual communication of an idea, and d) professional presentation.
